kitchen-midden (kich'en-mid'n), n. [*kitchen*
+ *midden*, after the equiv. Dan. *kykkemidd...*]
A shell-mound; the literal translation
of the Danish *kykkemidding*, kitchen refuse.
This refuse form a extensive heaps or mounds, which
consist chiefly of the shells of edible mollusks mixed with
fragments of bones of various animals, and implements of

stone, bone and horn. Mounds of this kind are found in
large numbers on the eastern coast of Denmark, in various
parts of Scotland along the shores of the north, as well
as in Ireland and elsewhere. They are the refuse heaps
which accumulated around the dwellings of former in-
habitants, and in the case of Denmark are believed by
the best authorities to date to the early part of the
Neolithic age, "where the finest flint implements
was known but the most primitive and the greatest develop-
ment" (*Six J. of Archaeology*, 2d ed., p. 249).
